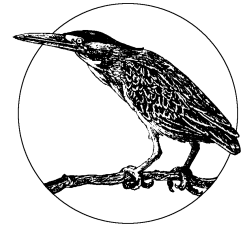

APRIL RECAP

Twenty-one people attended April's meeting, including newcomers Joe and Diane Cutcher, and the Gene and Patty Naujock brought their grandkids, Savannah and Owen. Rosann Kovalcik's presentation, 'Berries, Bugs and Snags,' was extremely informative. The audience, after viewing her slide show, will certainly think twice before planting non-native trees and shrubs in their yards. Rosann distributed handouts entitled 'Michigan Native Plants for Bird-Friendly Landscapes' produced by the Michigan Audubon Society.

Some presentation highlights:

- Native oak trees can have up to 557 different caterpillar species!
- It takes anywhere from 6,240 to 9,120 caterpillars to rear just one clutch of Black-capped Chickadees!
- Blue Cohosh berries are a super food source for thrushes
- Nutritional differences between native and non-native berries are huge!
- Birds have brown fat, verses white fat—very different from humans
- Homeowners should hold off until late May to perform spring cleaning of their yards
- Having a dead log lying in your yard is great for all varieties of thrushes
- Keep dead snags for a variety of reasons, including shelter and perches for birds

Each September, tens of thousands of broad-winged hawks pass over this area designated as one of the premier hawk watching sites in North America. Typically, 200,000 birds of prey migrate over Lake Erie Metropark from September through November on their southward journey. Join us for a great weekend of games, crafts, guest speakers and fun. Live birds of prey will be on hand. Fee: \$2 per person at the Nature Center.
