MARCH RECAP

23 people attended Jennifer Braatz's presentation on the Detroit International Wildlife Refuge, which showcased the growing Refuge and what currently is and what will be available soon! This refuge is the only International Wildlife Refuge in the United States! It is 6,000 acres and includes 48 miles of the Detroit River and Lake Erie shorelines. This is also a Federal urban refuge. The visitor center is well underway and the long fishing pier is also under construction, set to open in Spring 2017. Some of the visitor services include fishing, observations, hunting, photography and education. Humbug Marsh is included in the DIWR and is one of only 38 "Ramsar" sites in the U.S. (part of an international agreement to protect wetlands). There will be open houses on May 14th for International Migratory Bird Day. Jennifer mentioned that volunteer positions would soon available. Check the website he www.fws.gov/refuge/detroit_river!

RUSTY BLACKBIRD MIGRATION BLITZ

During the 2014 inaugural season, 4,570 birders submitted 13,400 checklists reporting Rusty Blackbirds to eBird.org. The 2015 Blitz built on this impressive beginning, with 4,885 birders submitting 13,919 checklists. The third and final Blitz kicked off March 1, and once again birders are asked to search for Rusty Blackbirds, especially in Areas of Interest, locations that supported large flocks of Rusties previously. Check Areas of Interest for an interactive map. Michigan birders can report their sightings to eBird through the first week of May. Please use the "Rusty Blackbird Spring Migration Blitz" protocol option available under "Observation Type- Other" in eBird between 1 March and 15 July only. information, For go rustyblackbird.org/outreach/migration-blitz
